Councilman Gandy motioned to open the public portion on agenda items only. Councilwoman Lomanno seconded the motion, which passed with all members present voting in favor in a voice vote.

John Gentless of 111 Union Avenue inquired about Ordinance 24:11. The Clerk stated it would be discussed at the public session during the September 5, 2025 meeting.

Mike Mancini of 3 Winding Way Road inquired to the Ordinance 24:11 but wanted to hear from Coucnil. Councilman Kelly and Mayor Hall responded.

Councilman Tolomeo motioned to close the public portion for agenda items. Councilwoman Lomanno seconded the motion, which passed with all members present voting in favor in a voice vote.

POLICE/OEM REPORT: Ron Morello provided the following report of the Stratford Borough Police Department Activities for July 2024:

- 7/5 During the evening hours, a parked vehicle on Rolling Road was smashed pretty good, by a hit and run vehicle traveling at a high rate of speed. The victim's vehicle was pushed approximately 60 feet and across the road, the striking vehicle fled toward Parkview Road never to be located.
- During the morning hours, officers again responded to a series accident on White Horse Pike & Wright Avenue. In this case, a vehicle approaching Wright and the White Horse Pike stopped passed the stop sign. An east bound vehicle, swerved, struck the vehicle, overturned and spun for 65 feet across 3 lanes. Fortunately, all injuries were not terribly serious.
- 7/11 During the afternoon hours, we were called to Aldi's for a report of a female shoplifter fleeing the store. Officers located a 50-year-old vagrant running down Cooper Avenue with \$200.00 in stolen merchandise. She was arrested and charged with shoplifting, drug offenses and theft after officers recovered a stolen Amazon delivery from a home on Colby Avenue.

- 7/11 An arrest was made for counterfeiting, another homeless drug addict passing counterfeit \$20.00 bills at Hortons, Dollar General Goodwill. 40-year-old male was arrested the next day coming across Berlin Road toward the Somerdale Methadone Clinic. Luckily, he was wearing the same clothes with \$100.00 in funny money on him.
- 7/13 A resident of Clementon reported a road rage that begin on White Horse Road in Voorhees concluded when another driver pointed a handgun at the motorists near White Hall. No suspects, and a bad license plate was obtained.
- 7/14 The next day, another road rage that resulted in a female being maced by another female driver at Weber's. That attacker fled west on WHP, again no suspects.
- 7/16 During the afternoon hours, a pedestrian was struck while walking east on WHP. In this case, a driver intending to turn right, began to move without seeing the pedestrian who walking in front of the vehicle. He suffered broken bones.
- 7/17 During the evening hours, we recovered a stolen vehicle on the 300 block of Princeton that was taken in Somerdale.
- 7/18 At 5:30am, the bandits involved with the Princeton Avenue car case, arrived on Hillside Road.............
- 7/21 Overnight, thieves in a white cargo van stolen a motorcycle from the parking lot of White Hall and went on to steal 3 other cycles in Lindenwold and Clementon.
- 7/22 A big break in our May burglary on Overhill Road. In this case, ring from South America was traversing the country. The stolen property was recovered and is in our possession.
- 7/27 During the afternoon, we were called to meeting with Loss Prevention from Pep Boys regarding an employee embezzlement case. Investigation revealed an assistant manager was pocketing bank deposits over a period of time. A 55-year-old resident of Stratford was arrested and charged with embezzlement related crimes.
- 7/28 Four juveniles from Oak Ridge Apartments were unidentified by video footage, they caused thousands of dollars in damage to the pool at Under the Sun. They forced their way into the pool shed and dumped every ounce of chemicals and liquids they could find into the pool. Because of their age, they will enter in to our Stationhouse Adjustment Program and hope the parents make restitution.

One full school year has passed since we decommissioned the staffed crossing post at Laurel and Atlantic. Based on our assurances that we would revisit the location, a recent parental survey was conducted, and we will staff the location again based upon survey responses that children will be using the crosswalk this year
