PUBLIC WORKS AND LIGHTING

Councilman Tolomeo gave the DPW report for August 2024:

Prepare for National Night Out by collecting the books at the Library to be given away, assemble newly purchased games for children, assemble new popcorn machine, and deliver these and other items to Yellin School in advance of the event. Subsequently the event was cancelled due to weather.

During the month, continued to cut grass regularly at the borough buildings, parks, playgrounds, and railroad corridor.

Weed garden beds around town.

Install several new 'Welcome to Stratford' signs on major roadways. These large colorful signs depict various locations and organizations in Stratford.

Replace two street signs, one parking sign at Community Center, and install no dumping signs at the alleyways at Suburban Terrance and Laureba Avenue.

Painting of the diesel tank and one DPW facility exterior building was completed.

Courtesy treatment of three hornet nests located within the municipal roadways were remediated.

Routine maintenance of equipment and vehicles.

3 trash trucks were taken to mechanic for periodic servicing.

The chipper has been repaired and is back in operation. This was an investment of over \$5000 into a very good machine. A new similar machine would have cost approx. \$50,000. The chipping schedule is every two weeks and is noted on the town calendar as a reminder too.

Remember yard waste will end at the end of October for this year.
